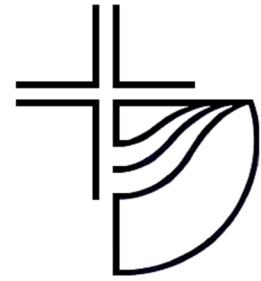

## 13<sup>th</sup> Annual Tenderloin Feast

The 13<sup>th</sup> annual Montezuma Tenderloin Feast will be on Saturday, February 24<sup>th</sup> at the Montezuma Hall. As always, there will be an outstanding menu of pork tenderloin and gravy, sweet potatoes, macaroni and cheese, beans, fresh spinach salad, cranberry salad, pickled eggs, pickles, assorted homemade breads and desserts, coffee and tea.

There will be five seating times for the meal: 12:30pm, 2:00pm, 3:30pm, 5:00pm and 6:30pm. Tickets are \$14 for adults and \$7 for children age 3-12. You can purchase tickets on Sunday mornings at church or you may call Stephanie Diehl at 540-879-3567. Tickets for takeout boxes are available, as well.

We will need many volunteers to cook, serve, clean up, etc. and volunteers to provide homemade breads, desserts and pickles. Sign-up sheets are in the entry way at the church.

Proceeds for this event will go towards the Montezuma Church of the Brethren Building Improvement Fund.

## Lent Begins February 14 – Answering God

### *Ash Wednesday meal and worship planned*

It's not very often that Ash Wednesday and Valentine's Day kiss (to use a vivid image from the Psalms), and yet that's what's happening this year. Montezuma will embrace Ash Wednesday and the Lenten season not because we are morbid killjoys. Rather, we can face death and the transiency of life because we affirm that "love is strong as death, passion fierce as the grave" (Song of Sol. 8:6). Our first reason? Jesus Christ our Lord.

We will mark the beginning of Lent with an Ash Wednesday soup and sandwich meal, beginning at 5:30 p.m., February 14, in the church's fellowship room. That meal will be followed by a brief worship that will conclude in time for choir practice. Sign-up sheets are available to help us plan.

The theme for our Lenten focus this year is Answering God. In recent years the church has published a daily reading guide for Lent and this year will continue that tradition. Please pick up a Daily Readings for Lent 2018 at the church in February.

## MCOB Constitution Revision Underway

Following the direction of the Church Board, a small committee has been at work updating and revising the congregation's constitution and by-laws. The committee's chairperson is David Richard; other members are Stephanie Diehl, Helen Shickel, and Pastors Gabe Dodd and David Miller. The revision will not be brought to vote until at least November 2018 and will require a two-thirds majority for any changes made to the current constitution. The committee is working to bring a draft of the revision to the congregation for review and discussion by the spring. There will be several opportunities for the revision committee to explain and discuss proposed changes with the congregation.

Peace of my mind:

There are a few things on my mind. This year we experience a kind of weird overlap between the church's holy days and secular frivolity. Lent begins with Ash Wednesday on Valentine's Day and ends on Easter Sunday, which falls on April 1.

Yeah, that's right. April Fool's. This has not happened in my lifetime – last time was 1956, I think – but it certainly offers us an opportunity for contrast. Some will note the correspondence of April Fool's and Easter and take satisfaction in saying: At last, Easter finally arrives on an appropriate day to describe the poor souls who believe all that nonsense.

Yes, we must be prepared. But do not be afraid. In fact, laugh along. Once you break through the familiarity of resurrection language which we absorb in church, the conviction that Christ is raised and that we will share with him in the resurrection of our bodies is not scientifically provable, much less self-evident. And yet, this is our faith. Early Christians seemed like fools to those who didn't agree with them, and today those who follow Jesus will look like fools in a society that promotes self-aggrandizement and defeating one's enemies. It's not an easy practice.

So, as we reflect upon the transient nature of life with ashes on Ash Wednesday and look ahead to what God does on Easter Sunday through the promise that even our ashes are not forgotten, you might as well admit it can seem ridiculous. We are fools. But we are fools in the hands of God.

A second thing: when we see the correlation between the holidays this year, it reminds me that our praise of God is not an after-thought. It's been said that complaint psalms are the backbone of the Psalter. The psalmists complained. They told God what was on their mind; what was going wrong in their lives. And yet, the Psalms end with a cathedral of praise, Psalms 145-150. Life is full of hardship and trial; we are called to live by commandments that are a challenge to us personally and socially; we have enemies; we fear death. It is a long journey. The psalmists are not dismayed. They end in praise: "Let everything that breathes praise the Lord" (150:6)! Maybe that's the only real praise there can be – the kind that knows what hardship really is. This is the end-goal of our faith. In the middle, it may not seem possible. But this is the end.

The February's special offering is the Ministry of Hope at Commerce Village in Harrisonburg. This community numbers around 30 people. Most are veterans, but not all, and the majority are in their 50s-60s. Commerce Village has a director who supervises the program, and a couple of Montezuma members offer emotional, spiritual and practical support.

Money from this offering supports Ministry of Hope in two ways: first, to help residents with small food items or a bus ticket at the end of the month, and second, by covering costs for a monthly fellowship meal hosted by folks from Montezuma. Following this meal is a time for worship. Not all the residents participate but relationships are established. This is another opportunity for our community of faith to share the love and mercy of our Lord.

## Discovering God

Pastor Gabe is presenting a Capstone Integration Project as partial fulfillment for his Masters of Divinity. This project has been a long process of research and thoughtfulness, and he invites the church to attend the presentation on Wednesday, February 14, at 9am. ## Turning Pain into Hope

Many people might not know that I used to be a huge Batman fan. As a child I collected the toys, read comic books, and watched all the TV shows. Today, I would not consider myself a die-hard fan, but I still really like the character and I do get very excited when a new Batman movie comes out in theaters. Recently I went to watch the new movie, Justice League, and had an epiphany experience. In some dialogue between two characters (the Flash and Cyborg), the observation was made that each of these heroes were "birthed" out of accidents or tragedies. The Flash was struck by lightning, and Bruce Wayne (spoiler: he is Batman...) witnessed his parents get murdered in an alley when he was just a boy. In the Marvel comics, the X-Men and other heroes are mutants that were just born differently than most people through rare genetic mutation. The villains are also mostly from the result of accidents or tragedies: victims of abuse, acid spills (you know... the normal), PTSD, economic problems, etc. Although heroes and villains are born out of accidents and tragedies, there is some factor that determines how they respond to their unique experiences.

As human beings, our lives are individual and unique. After listening to people share their lives with me, I understand that we all experience special moments in life that might be frightening, traumatic, life-altering, or tragic. Think about it. Have you ever had someone close to you die suddenly, or have you suffered a life threatening illness, gotten into an accident, lost a job, been constantly rejected, or failed at something important? Most of the people I have heard from tell me that their faith is the thing that helps them determine what to do with those experiences. In my own understanding of traumatic events, God does not make these things happen. God does not cause us to hurt, to be in pain, to make us suffer. I believe that evil in the world causes these heartaches to happen. However, I believe that God is bigger and stronger than any of these events. Our faith in God's wisdom is far greater than what any individual can do to us. Our hope in Jesus Christ is more promising than medical threats. Our eternal reward is far more rewarding than earthly pains. This is not to say that our relationship heartaches and physical pains are minimal - but the difference between heroes and villains is how we continue to have faith and hope in a God that is good.

## EYN team repairs houses, distributes food

### Many homes of members of Ekklesiyar Yan'uwa a Nigeria

(EYN, the Church of the Brethren in Nigeria) were destroyed by fire during the Boko Haram insurgency. The EYN Disaster Ministry Response team has been working to re-roof the houses of the most vulnerable.

Once dry season arrived in north-eastern Nigeria last fall, housing

repairs went into full gear. A total of 57 homes were re-roofed in remote areas in the latter part of 2017.

Food distributions continued during the “lean period” from July through late October, a time in north-east Nigeria when food from the previous year’s harvest is almost gone and the new crop is not yet ready. The Boko Haram insurgency compounded this problem with a decreased ability

to even plant crops.

In the last few months of 2017, the EYN team carried out eight food distributions to around 300 families at a time. Food was bought in the local market, loaded on trucks, and taken to the distribution point, often a church. Leaders of the church districts created lists of needy families in their area, and contacted them to convene for the distributions.

## Brethren staff part of meeting with Palestinian president

### A Churches for Middle East Peace (CMEP) delegation met with Palestinian President Mahmoud Abbas

on Nov. 2, 2017, the 100th anniversary of the Balfour Declaration. The group included Church of the Brethren staff Nathan Hosler, director of the Office of Public Witness, who is serving as board chair for CMEP, and Roy Winter, associate executive director of Global Mission and Service and Brethren Disaster Ministries.

The historic declaration by Lord Balfour of Great Britain “[viewed] with favor the establishment in Palestine of a national home for the Jewish people” and stated “that nothing shall be done which may prejudice the civil and religious rights of existing non-Jewish communities in Palestine.”

CMEP executive director Mae Elise Cannon was part of the delegation. During the meeting, President Abbas expressed appreciation to Cannon for CMEP’s work.

## Workcamps repair buildings in PR

**In November, Church of the Brethren volunteers made repairs to church buildings and homes** in Puerto Rico that were damaged in the hurricanes of 2017. Two groups of volunteers, totaling seven people, assisted with the project, which received support from Brethren Disaster Ministries.

The workcamps at Caimito Church and Community Center were organized by Shirley Baker, with Jeff Bruens, disaster project leader, providing construction leadership, and other volunteers coming from churches in the continental US. These teams repaired the roof and ceiling at Segunda Iglesia Cristo Misionera, provided partial repairs to the Caimito

Community Center affiliated with the church, repaired the Brethren House, and worked on two homes in the area.

Additional work projects were being organized and planned for 2018.

Puerto Rico District, led by district executive José Otero, has been organizing a response to Hurricane Maria, with support from Brethren Disaster Ministries. As of November, more than \$28,000 in grant funds had been sent to the district, some coming from special donations received by several districts of the Church of the Brethren, and some through the Emergency Disaster Fund. The money has helped meet emergency needs in the communities around the seven Churches of the Brethren in Puerto Rico.

In August 1999 she began in her current role. A key focus of her work has been facilitating daily operation of the pastoral placement system, working with district staff. She provided administrative support for the director of Ministry and facilitated support for the director's work with the Brethren

Academy for Ministerial Leadership.

**Brenda Reish** concluded employment as treasurer and executive director of business services at Bethany Theological Seminary Dec. 31, after 19 years of service to the school. When she began in August 1998, she served as business manager for both Earlham School of Religion and Bethany, as well as treasurer for Bethany, until 2002, when a separate business office was established for each school. As treasurer under three Bethany presidents, Reish was responsible for institutional finances as an internal auditor. During her tenure, Bethany received clean audits each year and the endowment grew from \$10 million to \$39 million.

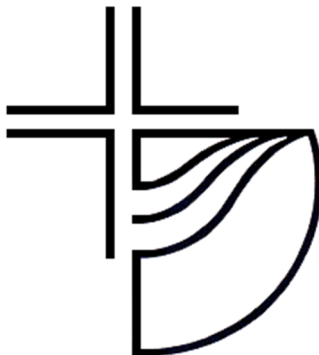
