Peace of my mind

We enter the holiday season in November. In fact, the first day of November is All Saints Day. We normally pay more attention to Halloween – "all hallows eve" – than to the more liturgically significant All Hallows Day.

Who are these "saints"? The New Testament calls Christians saints. Paul opens several of his letters by speaking to "all those called to be saints" or simply "saints" (Rom. 1:7; 1 Cor. 1:2; 2 Cor. 1:1; Eph. 1:1; Phil. 1:1; Col. 1:1). A saint is a person called to be set apart, separate. And that is what all Christians are: a holy work of God, not so much because we are good, or better than others, because, in fact, we may not be better than some others. Rather, we have been called by God into the life of Jesus Christ and his beloved community.

Saints. Do you feel like a saint? I sure don't most days. In fact, if I were to characterize this society in which we live, I would describe it as dedicated to the "de-saint-ification" of the world (there's a word for you!).

In this commercial world, we are not called to be set apart, but to be readily involved as consumers. Eat this, buy that, go here or there, experience this or that. Be all that you can be. Just do it. Just buy it.

All Saints Day follows Halloween where we have gorged on zombies, horror shows, and candy. Actually, the zombie theme is apropos to All Saints Day since worship on All Saints Day is especially alert to departed saints – those who have died and are now in paradise. Pity the poor zombies who are dead but still roaming the earth in a pointless effort to find and destroy those who remain alive. But what are the still-living in these stories reduced to? Hiding and relentless violence against predatory zombies.

Yikes! What a metaphorical description of our world.

The kingdom of saints called forth by Jesus Christ is to live differently. We have hope that's based on more than our own power or desperate quest for more of this or that. We are taught by Jesus to be saints and to see others, even those who are zombie-like, as potential saints, or at least as souls. When you read this, All Saints Day will be past, but the message of that day is always good.

#EternalReward

"...But strive first for the kingdom of God and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well..." Matthew 6:25-34

As established in previous sermons, the way of the world is not equal to the way of the Lord. Sometimes the world requires us in ways the Lord Sometimes the world asks us to does not. participate in ways that conflict with God's desires. Perhaps the world has motives that the Lord does not have. For example, the "American dream" is for people to be successful in life if you work hard enough. This success is measured by self-happiness. The conflict here is that the bible does not teach followers of Christ to do things that make us happy. Jesus does not even promise that we will be happy on earth. What Jesus does promise is an eternal reward (2 Corinthians 4:17-18).

One reason why I am reflecting on this is because I sometimes struggle with the idea that I must benefit directly in the things I invest in. I have caught myself thinking things like, "if I spend a weekend at this youth event, what's in it for me?" or "I will go help you move in... unless something better comes up!" or "Why would I raise money for something that will not support me?" Have you ever thought like this? I need the reminder from time to time that God provides for our needs. God requires our childlike faith to follow our commitments, to answer our callings, and to trust in God as we travel together through life.

When we serve others, we should not think about reward. We should just think about following God (Matthew 25:37-40). In the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus teaches that following him is not a leisurely or instantly rewarding journey (Matthew 5-7). Jesus does teach that when we follow God, we support others with a servant's heart. We will act out of full humility regardless of whether we receive the money for the fundraiser, if we will be 'giving away' our time, or if we will be successful in the eyes of our neighbors. Jesus loves us unconditionally, and we must serve others unconditionally. When we follow God, God will provide for our needs.

CDS team serves in Las Vegas after mass shooting

hildren's Disaster Services (CDS) deployed a team of Critical Response Childcare volunteers to Las Vegas, Nev., following the mass shooting. The team was requested by the American Red Cross, and served in a Family Assistance Center.

Team member Patty Henry reported that "this center is expecting up to 27,000 people who have been affected by this tragedy." Her report noted the privacy regulations in place. The CDS team was only able to take photos of the center before people arrived, and photos of the team itself, and cell phones were silenced out of respect.

To help in their work, the CDS team received donations of playdough, paint, and other supplies from Child Life Specialists at a Las Vegas hospital, and Save the Children.

The Critical Response Childcare team receives specialized training to care for children following situations of extreme trauma, or mass casualty events. Since 1997, the team has responded to the terrorist attacks of 9/11, 8 aviation incidents, 1 train incident, the Boston Marathon bombing, and the mass shooting in Orlando.

Brethren in DR Congo threatened by violence

Global Mission and Service in late September requested prayer for the Church of the Brethren in the Democratic Republic of Congo. Word was received from Lubungo Ron, leading minister for the Congolese Brethren, that violence was "on a high level" in areas where church members live. He reported by e-mail that violence was affecting "South Kivu province, especially in Fizi and Uvira territories" and that "people are killed day by day, it is like a massacre." Mai-Mai rebels had moved close to towns, and the military forces of the government had begun to flee.

Venezuela church gains official recognition

"Praise God for the official government recognition of the Church of the Brethren in Venezuela!" said an announcement from Global Mission and Service. The Venezuelan government has approved incorporation under the name Asociación Iglesia de los Hermanos (ASIGLEH). The board of the Venezuelan Brethren will visit each congregation to officially register them. More than 60 congregations have expressed interest in joining the church.

Brethren response in Puerto Rico

rethren Disaster Ministries is responding in Puerto Rico, after the island was devastated by Hurricane Maria. Planning included-in the short term-the shipping of a container of disaster relief supplies and a visit by Roy Winter, associate executive director of Brethren Disaster Ministries and Global Mission and Service. In the long-term, plans include relief and long-term recovery programs, and home repair.

Supplies were gathered at the Brethren Service Center in New Windsor, Md., where Material Resources staff filled the container. It included canned chicken from Mid-Atlantic and Southern Pennsylvania Districts, generators, tarpaulins, flashlights, batteries, and chain saws.

"Our resources, support, and programs will be much more effective when we can gather the church leadership," Winter said. In late September, he was able to talk by phone with Puerto Rico District executive Jose Calleja Otero, for the first time since the hurricane. Otero was working to assess the situation and to connect with pastors in the district.



Leadership Team issues statement to the denomination

he following statement was issued by the Leadership Team on Sept. 21. The group includes the Annual Conference officers-moderator Samuel Kefas Sarpiya, moderator-elect Donita J. Keister, secretary James M. Beckwith-with general secretary David A. Steele, district executive representative David D. Shetler, and Conference director Chris Douglas.

"The Leadership Team is aware that a district in the Church of the Brethren has made the decision to license to the ministry an individual who lives in an openly committed homosexual relationship. A new fellowship pastored by that individual was recognized by its district conference and was introduced at Annual Conference 2017. Since that time many questions have been raised regarding the accountability of districts. The Leadership Team has sought to clarify that in Church of the Brethren polity, the authority to credential ministers and to establish new congregations and fellowships belongs to the districts. At the same time, the Leadership Team is certainly aware that the intention of our polity is that districts will work within the covenant of our life together and abide by the decisions of Annual Conference.

"The 2002 Annual Conference action established the policy that the Church of the Brethren will 'consider it inappropriate to license or ordain to Christian ministry any persons who are known to be engaging in homosexual practices, and will not recognize the licensing and ordination of such persons in the Church of the Brethren.' It is the intent of denominational leadership to act in accordance with all the policies established by Annual Conference.

"The Leadership Team has been studying our polity to discern what actions might be taken when districts choose to act outside the covenant of Annual Conference decisions, and we find that our polity does not specify how the larger church should respond to this particular circumstance. We continue, however, to research Annual Conference minutes and plan to discuss the results of our research with Standing Committee at its next meeting. In the meantime, the moderator and moderator-elect are seeking opportunity to visit with the district that has made this decision, in order to discuss the various expressions of concern we have heard and to seek mutual understanding with district leadership as to why the district has made a decision in apparent contradiction to the 2002 Annual Conference decision, which was adopted by the church as a whole as a part of the covenant for our life

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"Regarding the introduction of new fellowships at Annual Conference, our polity calls us to respect the district's authority to grant fellowship and congregation status. And at the same time, our polity calls us to abide by the policies established by Annual Conference. Our best way of responding to the introduction of this fellowship in light of its pastoral leadership is Brother David Steele's response as general secretary:

"As staff, we are carefully evaluating our practices of recognizing new fellowships at Annual Conference and will make adjustments to make certain that any recognition at a future Annual Conference more closely aligns with our Annual Conference statements.'

"In the face of these conflicts, it is our deep desire to continue to strive for common ground that can lead us to a compelling vision for our life together. We hold in tension the need for a unified purpose in the midst of diverse points of view. We pray that we all will continue to strive together, seeking peace through love and grace in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ."

Pete Kontra begins Jan. 1, 2018, as district executive in Atlantic Northeast District. He has been in pastoral ministry for more than 20 years, currently is senior pastor at Hempfield (Pa.) Church of the Brethren, and has served as chair of the district board for the past two years. He holds a master of divinity degree from Bethany Seminary.

Debbie Roberts has resigned as assistant professor of reconciliation studies at Bethany Seminary, as of Dec. 31, in order to pastor Sunnyslope Church of the Brethren in Wenatchee, Wash. Hired in July 2013, she was the first to hold this faculty position and developed the seminary's academic program in reconciliation studies. Her

courses in conflict transformation, mediation, and restorative justice showed strong enrollment, and in fall 2016 became the core of a new certificate in conflict transformation.

Melissa Fritz began Oct. 2 as a packer for Material Resources, working at the Brethren Service Center in New Windsor, Md.


