International S.S. Lesson: Blessing, Glory, Honor Forever

Peace of my mind:

The weekend you receive this newsletter is the highpoint of the church's calendar. Emotions run the gamut of ABC's old Wide World of Sports -"the agony of defeat" and the "thrill of victory." At least that's how it looks to us as we hear the story. Agony and thrilling victory.

When we read the gospels, the dividing line isn't that neat. The agony part is clear enough. Jesus's humiliation and death on a cross is bad news on the face of it. The first three gospels describe Jesus's friends either standing at a distance or absent altogether. John's description has the Beloved Disciple bringing Jesus's mother to the foot of the cross along with two Marys Magdalene (Jesus's aunt and Mary interestingly, Jesus's mother is never called by name in John's Gospel).

The intensity of this suffering cannot be underestimated. Neither should we diminish the suffering of others in the world who have been publicly tortured to death in front of their families. This is not something exceptional – there are people around us who have watched innocent family members killed before their eyes.

The good news of Jesus's victory over death, his being raised by the Father, is the wellspring of the revolution that became the church. At Easter we are right to raise our alleluias and rejoice. But it is worth a lot for us to allow the Easter readings to guide our own experience of agony and ecstasy. The clarity of agony is rarely, if ever, rivaled by ecstasy in this life. Pain is not thoroughly washed away. Jesus's disciples are extraordinarily cautious in their response to the risen Jesus: they fail to recognize him, to believe him, to know what to do with him.

Their eyes and their hearts are not aligned. Are not in sync. Our lives, in digesting agony and recovery, joy and gratitude, are often the same. Can it be? Is it really so? Has my grief really been defeated? Can I rejoice in truth? Dare I trust again? These are not simple, straight-forward steps. But they are legitimate signs of Easter. Of life for those who trust a risen Lord. The distance between agony and ecstasy is very rarely three days. All the same, resurrection is real. Alleluia! He is risen, indeed!

Give a Girl a Chance aims to help Sudanese girls and women get the education and skills training they need to live happy, healthy and productive lives. Education is the key to later marriage, fewer children, and life opportunities. Yet millions either never attend school or withdrawal at an early age.

Give a Girl a Chance works with grassroots groups to address the challenges families face. NCP has helped 300 girls go to school and even helped build a school. Below is a chart of how money can be used.

\$6 1 year's supply of hygiene kits

\$10 School uniform

\$55 1 year's tuition (elementary)

\$250 1 year's boarding for secondary school

\$750 1 year's cost of completing secondary education

Discovering God

"Ask and it will be given to you; seek and you will find; knock and the door will be opened to you. For everyone who asks receives; the one who seeks finds; and to the one who knocks, the door will be opened. Matthew 7:7-8

Have you ever lost your keys or your phone, and you just couldn't find it anywhere? You check the bathroom, your bed, the kitchen table - perhaps even in the refrigerator - before realizing that they were in your hands the whole time? I have had plenty of moments like that. Usually my reactions to things happens too soon. When I get lost, it's because I turned too soon. When I get into an argument with Pam - it takes me a while to understand that I act out of reaction - instead of taking time to notice the situation. When I respond out of my first reaction, I am usually not showcasing my best self. 9 times out of 10, if I take some moments to pause before I respond - I respond with more grace.

This is why it has been important for me to practice patience, and the spiritual gift of observation. It is hard work to change from the ordinary! When I take time to observe, I am able to appreciate the moment, to realize my part in a disagreement, and to find God in ways I was not able to before. The truth of 'God's Love' is always present. We just need to notice it. When money is tight, God is there. When you or someone you love is suffering, God is there. When you get agitated from a post on social media, God is there. God is present to us when we are thriving, and God is present to us when we are failing. Know that when we fail, or when we experience unwanted feelings, God wants us to take notice of the power of patience. Perhaps when we look everywhere for God, we are being too hurried to realize that God is right there, in your own hands.

Not only should we practice 'paying attention', but as we do that, we will discover more about God that was also always there, but was not revealed to us yet. God wants to show us the wonder and splendor of the Kingdom, all we need to do is knock, seek, and ask.

'Compelling vision' process to be central at Annual Conferences next two years

nnual Conference in 2017 called the Leadership Team

of the denomination, along with the Council of District Executives, to develop a process through which the church will engage in conversations leading to a "compelling vision" for the church's life together.

A Compelling Vision Working Group has been formed, comprising general secretary David Steele, 2018 Annual Conference moderator Samuel Sarpiya, 2019 moderator Donita Keister, Conference director Chris Douglas, and two district executives chosen by the council, Colleen Michael and John Janzi. The 2020 moderator will join this group following this year's Annual Conference.


This working group has set in place a process by which the church will be led through a time of envisioning beginning with Annual Conference 2018 and continuing through the 2019 Conference. The process is intended to move beyond conversations, debates, and official statements to living out the steps that will move the denomination forward "with vision and purpose as we proclaim and serve Christ together."

A Compelling Vision Process Team of seven individuals from across the denomination, with Sarpiya, Keister, and Douglas, will work during Annual Conference 2018 and 2019 and also alongside district gatherings to engage the church in conversations that will generate themes leading to a vision with a distinctive direction for the Church of the Brethren. During the 2018 Conference, one full business session and a portion of a second will be structured to begin the envisioning process. Following the 2018 Conference, district gatherings will provide input to the development of a denominational vison statement. Annual Conference 2019 will be primarily dedicated, including most of the business sessions, to the development of a compelling vision for the Church of the Brethren.

The Leadership Team and Council of District Executives are encourag-

ing all congregations "to be present in these conversations bringing your unique contributions and sharing in the hard work of discovering God's plan for how we will continue to be the body of Christ in this broken world."
