Matthew 18:15-22; John 13:1-17; Exodus 12:1-4, 11-14; Isaiah 53:1-6 Peace of my mind:

Recently I finished James McPherson's Battle Cry of Freedom, a very large one volume history of the American Civil War. What a book! It startles me how much there is to know about this country, and how little any one person can know.

The book describes battles, strategy and tactics; dips into the personalities of leaders and generals; reviews the conflicts over liberty, property, and government. That's what we expect. But what about the nurses? The women who showed up at numerous field hospitals and convalescence centers that resulted from every single major battle? What about the administrators who organized supply chains when railroad tracks were regularly upended, bridges blown-up, and roads reduced to mud during heavy rains and winter storms? What about the people who didn't want to fight – and there were many who found ways to avoid conscription? All of that and much, much more is part of this story.

The Civil War is a wound in our national soul. It's been more than 150 years, yet the contours of that war – what is liberty? What is the proper role of government? Who shares in full participation in our society? – are still being played out in our politics.

The church was as divided by this war as the rest of society. The Gospel of Jesus Christ did not create a united church. Some churches fought to retain slaves; others passionately worked to free them; and many – perhaps most – could see both sides of the argument. Slavery couldn't be right, but slaves were property and they were not the same as white people.

It is a painful history. It is a still living history. It is a cross that we bear – chaotic, conflictual, bloody, and destructive. Many people were heroic. But heroic toward what end?

Brothers and sisters, we are in Lent: on the road to Good Friday. That Friday represents the truth about us. Not just Pilate and the Romans, or Caiaphas and Jewish leaders. It is our truth. We do crucify our Lord. We who pray to the same God too often fight one another to the death in the name of that God. This is not right. We know it is wrong. And yet Friday comes.

The resurrection we await is bigger than personal salvation. It resulted in something beyond the personal – the raised Jesus was the catalyst for the church. We carry this raised Jesus in our own lives and in the body called church. If we don't live that, why should anyone believe the Gospel?

Caring for each other with the comfort of Christ

But the Advocate, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you everything, and remind you of all that I have said to you. Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled, and do not let them be afraid.

~ John 14:26-27

Sometimes, late at night, I am summoned to the nursery by my 13 month old son, Elias. He is at the age, and has been for some time, that he does not like to be alone in his room. He can play with his toys by himself only if you are in the room with him. He will eat his dinner by himself only if you are sitting nearby. He is able to go on a long car ride only if one of us acknowledges him by holding his hand every hour or so. And at night he can sleep soundly only if he knows you are near. Usually Pam or I will come into the room and quietly observe. Sometimes I will sit outside his crib to let him know, "I am here. I see you. I know you are in need. Everything is fine." Sometimes Elias will lay back down in his crib, and fall back asleep. There is something about the presence of a familiar voice or face that brings a sense of peace into his life.

In some research I have been reading, apparently the same is true for our young people of the church. Although their ways of seeking comfort are via media and technology, experts say that the technology is not the driving factor of social media. The messages young people are sending are the same basic human needs of any person that has lived in any era; "Where are you? Do you see me? I have needs. Will everything be okay?" Think of any young person. The person you are thinking of might seek attention by acting goofy in school. Maybe they go the extra mile for their favorite teacher. Perhaps the young person you are thinking of is someone who is bullied and responds in inappropriate ways by harming others back. The message they are sending is the same.

Brethren from the DR, Spain start churches in Europe

n the 1990s, a wave of Dominicans began leaving their home country to look for a better life in Spain. Members of Iglesia de los Hermanos (the Church of the Brethren in the Dominican Republic) were among them. In time they established the Church of the Brethren in Spain.

As the economy sputtered in Spain, some members were on the move again. Several moved to London some years ago and started a house church. This preaching point was recognized in 2016 by the Asamblea or Annual Conference of Iglesia Evangelica de los Hermanos (the Church of the Brethren in Spain).

Last fall, on the way to the 2017

Asamblea, Global Food Initiative manager Jeff Boshart and Fausto Carrasco, pastor of Nuevo Comienzo, St. Cloud, Fla., stopped in London. They visited Karen Meriguete, founder of Roca Viva Church of the Brethren, and several other members. She recently turned over leadership of the new fellowship to her brother, Edward De La Torres, and has begun a second plant in a different neighborhood of London.

Meriguete and most of the other house church members are of Dominican heritage but are Spanish citizens, which allows them to move freely across the European Union. House churches are starting in Holland and Germany as well—all springing from the Brethren in Spain. —Jeff Boshart

Grants support disaster work, hunger relief, seminary in India

Prethren Disaster Ministries has directed grants from the Emergency Disaster Fund (EDF) to the Disaster Recovery Support Initiative, to develop new project sites, and to assist families displaced by violence in the Democratic Republic of Congo. The Global Food Initiative (GFI) has given grants to a Going to the Garden retreat, an aquaponics system in Haiti, community gardens in Spain, and a feeding ministry in Mexico.

In addition, a grant of \$15,000 has been given by Global Mission and Service to Gujarat United School of Theology in India, for repairs to classrooms and other facilities. GUST is a seminary of the Church of North India, a longstanding ecumenical partner.

An EDF grant of \$50,000 funds work in the US Virgin Islands by the Disaster Recovery Support Initiative (DRSI), following Hurricanes Irma and Maria. DRSI is a partnership with the United Church of Christ and the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ).

An EDF grant of \$25,000 funds development of new project sites for Brethren Disaster Ministries, related to last fall's hurricanes and fires.

An EDF grant of \$10,000 to Shalom Ministry for

Reconciliation and Development in the DRC follows two grants totaling \$15,000, which have distributed food to 950 households or nearly 7,500 people.

A GFI grant of \$4,892.50 funds an aquaponics system requested by the community development staff of Eglise des Freres Haitiens (Church of the Brethren in Haiti). It is a prototype to be replicated elsewhere in conjunction with the Haiti Medical Project. The project is a cooperative effort of Eglise des Freres, Capstone 118, and GFI.

GFI grants of \$4,455 and \$3,850 support community gardens of Iglesia Evangelica de los Hermanos (Church of the Brethren in Spain). The projects are sponsored by the Gijon and Aviles congregations, and the Lanzarote congregation in the Canary Islands.

A GFI grant of \$4,450 funds a second Going to the Garden retreat for community gardeners, to be held in New Orleans, La., hosted by GFI partner Capstone 118. It will focus on the role of the church in local advocacy for healthier food systems, hands-on advanced gardening, and social entrepreneurship.

A GFI grant of \$1,000 purchases a stove and refrigerator for a Bittersweet Ministries feeding program in Tijuana, Mexico.


