28: First Sunday of Easter: On the Road Pastor David Luke 24:13-35

Here are some dejected, hang-dog disciples. Leaving town, feeling the agony of defeat. Though they don't know it, Jesus meets them right where they are. Then he "opens" the scripture to them; and then he shares a meal with them, during which they recognize him, only to have him disappear. Yet their hearts are filled with joy and they go back out into the world, on their way to tell others. It's a picture of the church's life.

International S.S. Lesson: Call and Commissioning

Peace of my mind:

Most of us don't sleep like we used to. Children – most of the time – sleep well. They wear themselves out and sleep "like the dead." Some of them may stay up later than we want them to; others, rise and shine earlier than we like. But at least they sleep.

As we grow older, as – how do we say it now? – "our bodies change," a good night's sleep is less common, or at least no certainty. We may wear ourselves out, too, but sleeping like "the dead" is rare. In dark morning hours we wait for sleep.

April is the "cruelest" month T. S. Eliot famously said in a disturbing poem. From deep sleep, we are awakened ... rudely. April being the month in northern climes when seeds awaken and grow in the still cold nights, pushing toward the Sun ... and the rain and wind and possible frost.

We don't think of Easter in these terms. Usually, we think of glory. And it is glory. Like a Red Bud in beautiful flower against a still gray mountainside. Forsythia, audaciously yellow, defy freezing temperatures. Yes, glory. Yes, here is life again. This is the way of God's creation – awakening, great beauty, followed by fruitfulness, then decline, then sleep.

To proclaim the Gospel of Jesus Christ is not to discredit this world. This is, after all, our world. We live it bodily; in our changing, sometimes sleepless bodies. What the gospel desires is that our wakefulness not be wasted. That we not be satisfied by platitudes or convention. We take things for granted – one day, one season, one cycle after another.

But the present is diverse, uncertain. And we need not wait for Gabriel's horn to sound before we experience it. Jesus was constantly telling his followers to see. Look and see at what is happening around you. God is present. Sleeping children arise one morning and we discover they are tall. We read our Bibles time after time, noticing very little, only to discover that we are part of this story, playing many parts.

God is present in the midst of us. It will be cruel and sleepless before we see. And yet ...resurrection.

Below is a chart of how money can be used.

- \$30 = one year's tuition in DR Congo/ Nepal/South Sudan
- \$60 = one year's tuition in Narus, South Sudan
- \$300 = one year's tuition in Myanmar (boarding)
- \$5 = shoes/uniform/food: DR Congo

Living Peace Award Banquet is May 9 at Brethren Woods

Shenandoah District Pastors' for Peace invite you to their annual Living Peace Award Banquet, Thursday, May 9, 6:30 p.m., at Camp Brethren Woods, the Pine Grove building. The Living Peace Award acknowledges individuals or groups who are answering Jesus's call to be peacemakers in a variety of ways. In the past we have honored service to the Boys and Girls club in Harrisonburg, a farmer, jail chaplains, Sea Going Cowboys, missionaries, activists, and disaster response ministries. Speaker for the 2019 banquet is David Radcliff, executive director of New Community Project. Montezuma has contributed to that organization's Give a Girl A Chance program which promotes formal education for girls in countries where the education of girls is not a priority. Cost of the meal is \$17 for adults and \$10 for students, including college and graduate students. Registration forms, due by May 1, are available in the entry way or at the church office.

Easter Thoughts

This month we approach the death and resurrection of Jesus, and will continue to celebrate Easter for 50 days. To me, the resurrection is God's ultimate victory, and an invitation for our resurrection. How do we pay attention to our own resurrection? How do we defeat our own deaths with new life? In order to do that, we must recognize our deaths, and name them for what they are. Our deaths are not just personal, but they are communal.

Sure, there have been times when I have failed my family, the church, and God. I am sure we can all share in that shame. When I look back on my previous behavior and actions, I recognize times when I was not loving; times when I did not show empathy; and times when I did not sacrifice my own ways. There have been times when I have assumed the worst from people. There have been times when I have refused help. You could almost say that I have tried, at times, to keep the possibility of life and peace closed up in a dark tomb. Mostly these "efforts" are completely unintentional. For this, my prayer is for forgiveness and for an earthquake to burst open the tomb and reveal a resurrection and revival of sorts.

As we arrive in a season of resurrection, let us think of ways to be open and honest. Our invitation this Easter is to revive the life of the church. Our challenge is to be receptive to the revealing of God's thriving spirit that grows inside of us. This may happen through individual acceptance of Jesus as Lord, answering God's call to leadership, or active church participation. This may happen through compassion for others and relationship building. However we experience Easter, let us focus on the hope of new life, not the fear of death!

Letter opposes drone strikes, Brethren invited to rally

he Office of Peacebuilding and Policy in February signed an interfaith letter about CIA drone strikes. The letter from 25 faith-based organizations asked Congress to end the CIA's use of armed drones to carry out lethal attacks.

"There must be transparency and accountability regarding the use of lethal force undertaken on our behalf," the letter said, in part. "The CIA's program of drone strikes has expanded in the past two years to include strikes in Libya and Afghanistan. This is in addition to the CIA's long-term program of carrying out strikes in Pakistan, Yemen, and possibly other countries. . . . By refusing to acknowledge most of its strikes, the CIA prevents civilian victims from receiving justice and conveys moral responsibility for killing on to an American people who have never been informed about this secret war, nor had their members of Congress vote on it."

The office invites Brethren to a rally against drone warfare on May 3 in Washington, D.C. The rally will call for an end to CIA drone strikes and for General Atomics, the company responsible for development of Predator and Reaper drones, to sign the "Future of Life" pledge on lethal autonomous weapons.

GFI visits Brethren-founded groups in Ecuador



Ithough Church of the Brethren mission work in Ecuador ended in the 1970s.

the name lives on in Fundación Brethren y Unida (FBU, Brethren and United Foundation) and Unidad Educativa "Brethren" (Brethren Educational Unit). FBU is a non-governmental organization in Picalqui, about an hour north of the capital Quito, focused on environmental education for youth and teaching organic food production to women's groups. Unidad Educativa "Brethren" is in Llano Grande, in the greater Quito metropolitan area.

In 2017, Dale Minnich, a former Brethren mission worker in Ecuador and the first executive director of FBU, revisited Ecuador and the Global Food Initiative (GFI) began collaborating with

FBU. Two GFI grants supported FBU work with women and youth. This January, GFI manager Jeff Boshart visited to see FBU's work and attend a meeting as a newly appointed board member.

FBU is repairing and upgrading its facilities to attract more international volunteers and visitors. Boshart observed a cooking class and made several field visits. One morning was spent hiking near Lagunas de Mojanda, a crater lake in a protected biological reserve. Although deforestation is extreme in the area, the road to the lake was lined with more than 500,000 native trees planted over 15 years by school children with direction from FBU.

FBU maintains a tree nursery, a small dairy herd of 12 cows, plots of blackberries, tree tomatoes (tomarillo), and vegetables. Larger fields produce

wheat, alfalfa, and corn. FBU is seeking those with farming or gardening experience to spend time working on the farm and in community programs. Contact JBoshart@brethren.org.

In Llano Grande, Boshart was greeted warmly by elders who remember the US mission and asked about many mission workers by name. These elders were educated in the Brethren school and remain fiercely proud of the formation they received in both school and church many years ago. Although the church is now United Methodist, Brethren values of service, peacemaking, and concern for the most vulnerable members of society have become embedded in the community. In parting, the elders sent their greetings and hopes for more news and communication from old friends.

Pre-Conference Pilgrimage on July 2-3. The bus trip will start in Greensboro, N.C., make an overnight stay in Cherokee, and visit the Museum of the Cherokee and Oconaluftee Living Village.

Themes for the tour include righteousness and justice, a history of faith, land and lament, and doctrine of discovery. An announcement described Cherokee as "a place that is at once a sacred homeland for the Cherokee tribe, a place of modern cultural rebirth, and a tourist destination . . . where layers of history and a modern American dream collide.
